
As many of you may have noticed we've had a few dining chairs knocking about the place of over the past few weeks. This has been due to a customer dropping off



equipment that will enable them to set up and pack away more efficiently each session. Many thanks Paul.






an external steel rack for the welding shop. Is there no end to this man's talents?

This rejuvenated area will provide much pleasanter surrounds for bbq's and outdoor sitting (with septic disguised!)














When asked what happened to the grass at his camping area, Neil replied "Glyphosate mate!"

BEHIND THE MASK: THE GUIDE TO NEW AND TRENDING SCAMS



The Lowercase 'l' and the Fake Cab Website: The Difference One Little Letter Can Make!

One of our Melbourne clients let us know about a fake website impersonating 13 Cabs. The website domain looked identical to the official website except for a small but crucial difference. The "1" in "13 Cabs" was actually the lowercase letter "L." The fake website was designed to steal a person's name, address, email, and financial details. The fake website was found when clients were Google searching for cabs, and it appeared near the top of the list as a sponsored option.

Tip:

Remember that criminals can pay to have their fake websites appear at the top of a Google search too. Always check a website closely for errors.

The "No Interest Loan" Scam Impersonating Our Much-Loved Charities

How low can criminals go? Taking advantage of low-income earners searching for No Interest Loans by impersonating our reputable charities like Good Shepherd and Salvos is a new low. IDCARE analysts have detected a spike in these scams in January, with more than one report each day. In most cases, the client saw an advertisement for the No Interest Loan that appeared to be from a charity, advertised on Facebook. What's interesting about these cases is that criminals have used it to access their victims' myGov accounts – and that's where the damage is being done.

Tip:

If you are looking for a No Interest Loan, visit the charity's website directly and

don't go there through adverts on social platforms or links in emails and text messages. It is also important to protect your myGov account with a passkey, instead of a password.

& DONATIONS



s many of you may realise we raise s many or you may realise money to support the Shed in various ways. These are Membership fees, the Coffee boat, donations and Grants.

By appearing regularly at the Roleystone quarterly markets, and the Bedfordale markets, we raise much needed capital to use for the purchase of tools and equipment.

Another major source of income are Grants. These are sums of money that are offered by many and varied bodies to promote their causes, and support organisations such as ours.

You may not know that your President, Henry has been instrumental in applying for, and getting a number of grants over the time prior to our tenure, and during our time at the Waterwheel Shed.

Here are a list of most of the grants we have applied for, and been lucky enough to have received.

I have also included notable donations.

July 2023 - June 2024 = \$5000 (ex GST)

July 2023 - June 2024 = \$20,500 (inc GST)

June 2024 to present = \$6000 (inc GST)

I have not gone further back in time as this involved spending of the remainder of our Lotterywest grant to build a Shed back in 2016 as the 'Roleystone Men's Community Shed.'

Applying for Grants, and receiving the monies can be a long and tedious process, and they are always followed by proving their acquittal.

One grant we received some nine months ago was to set up our Community Shed garden. However, for reasons not yet clear we have been turned down. Inevitably this will mean Henry will now have to apply for a variation of the grant, as it was supposed to have been acquitted within twelve months of being granted! Having spent some of the money already towards setting up the Garden, Henry will find another avenue to justify keeping and the spending of the rest of the monies. Not an easy or straightforward task! One step forward, two steps back!

With the re-election of Hon. Hugh Jones MLA, we will soon be receiving the \$10,000 promised for a new Bandsaw and new Thicknesser. It should not take too long for these to find their way into the Shed.

Of course if you have any questions on the Shed's finances, please contact Henry or Jack, who will be able to bring you up to date with our monetary circumstances. Another way of keeping up to date is to attend one of the monthly Committee meetings, where the Shed's financial situation is revised to keep the Committee up to date - you never know, you might learn something!

DEATH TO MOSSIES!

The City of Armadale recently placed an order with the Department for 660 floating Mosquito "Dunks."

These dunks are designed to float on the surface of water bodies like ponds, birdbaths, and rain barrels, where mosquitoes usually lay their eggs.

Once placed in the water, the dunks continuously release Bacillus thuringiensis var. israelensis (Bt), a natural larvicide that specifically targets mosquito larvae. This bacterium paralyses the larvae's digestive system upon ingestion, leading to their demise within days.

By offering a proactive solution to control mosquito populations and reduce the risk of mosquito-borne diseases like Ross River virus, these dunks effectively kill mosquitoes before they can emerge as biting adults.

Mosquito Dunks are an environmentally friendly mosquito control option because they target mosquito larvae while posing minimal risk to non-target organisms. Bacillus thuringiensis var. israelensis is a naturally occurring bacterium that is safe for humans, pets, wildlife, and beneficial insects when used as directed. By selectively targeting mosquito larvae, Mosquito Dunks help preserve the ecological balance of aquatic environments while effectively reducing mosquito populations.
